5. CORPORATE ADMINISTRATION

5.1 <u>Regional District Fire Inspection of Public Used Facilities</u>

Paul Gipps, Chief Administrative Officer reported that the Office of the Fire Commissioner has recently notified UBCM that they are considering a change in legislation that would require Regional Districts to initiate a Fire Inspection Service. He noted that currently all municipalities are mandated with the responsibility of establishing and undertaking fire inspections of public used facilities. Mr. Gipps noted that staff has met with the Province regarding this issue stating that we agree with the concept, but not the delivery mechanism.

Discussion ensued regarding significant costs and challenges that would be placed on the Electoral Areas if this directive were to come into effect.

6. FINANCE

6.1 FVRD Purchasing Card Program – BMO Agreement

Moved By BOUCHER Seconded By FACIO

THAT the Fraser Valley Regional District Board authorize the Regional District to enter into an agreement with BMO to provide up to \$250,000 in credit capacity for a Purchasing Card program with the understanding that the Regional District will be responsible for payment of all amounts charged;

In response to a question if a rewards program is attached to the card, staff responded that our purchasing level is not sufficient to qualify for the rewards program.

7.1.1 FVRD Regional Solid Waste Removal Bylaw No. 1495, 2018

THAT the Fraser Valley Regional District Board consider giving three readings and adoption to the bylaw cited as *"Fraser Valley Regional District Regional Solid Waste Removal Bylaw No. 1495, 2018"*.

It was noted that effective January 1, 2019 Recycle BC will be now collecting candy wrappers and chip bags from the depots in Mission, and that they are proposing that these items be marketed as engineered fuel to be used for commercial purposes in lieu of coal as a pilot project. The lack of packing legislation was also highlighted. Further discussion took place, resulting in the following motion:

THAT the Fraser Valley Regional District Board direct staff to set up a meeting with the Minister of Environment and Climate Change to express concerns with Recycle BC's proposed pilot project to convert "other

flexible plastic packaging" (like candy wrappers and chip bags) into engineered fuel to be used as a coal substitute;

AND THAT staff bring back a report to the September Board meeting with respect to concerns with Recycle BC's proposal.

7.1.2 Air Quality and Wildfire Smoke in 2018

The report dated September 5, 2018 from the Environmental Services Coordinator pertaining to regional air quality issues and wildfire smoke experienced during the summer of 2018 was provided for information. Comments regarding poor air quality effects on health, other than just respiratory impacts were expressed. Discussion ensued regarding air quality effects on overall health, pollution from the Key West Asphalt plant located on Hwy 1 between Agassiz and Hope. and the impact of air pollution on agricultural crops.

Mr. Gipps reported that the FVRD has been approached by the Province to participate in a pilot regulation to allow FVRD to regulate Electoral Area businesses through a licensing program.

Mr. Gipps noted that a Special Vote will be conducted to for the Board to consider giving three readings to the *FVRD Hatzic Prairie Water Supply and Distribution System Service Area Amendment Bylaw No. 1491* and *FVRD Popkum Sewer Service Area Amendment Bylaw No. 1493, 2018.* The adopted bylaws will subsequently be forwarded to the September Board for adoption. The bylaws have to be submitted by October 1, 2018 to BC Assessment in order to meet the timeline for tax assessment for 2019.

11. **REPORTS BY DIRECTORS**

<u>Director Gaetz</u> reported on a recent incident where a homeless camp from Chilliwack River Valley was moved to a private property in Columbia Valley, without any consultation with the FVRD. Concerns were expressed that the Province, who has the necessary resources, are not taking responsibility on the homelessness issue and as a result the Regional Districts are left to deal with this matter. Following discussion, the following motion was put forward.

GAETZ/FACIO

THAT the Fraser Valley Regional District Board direct staff to bring back a report to the September Board meeting on the recent incident where a homeless camp was relocated from Chilliwack River Valley in Electoral Area E to Columbia Valley in Electoral Area H without prior consultation with the Regional District;

AND THAT staff be directed to bring back a recommended course of action on the strategy or policy on how to engage with the Provincial government to ensure that such incidents do not recur again.

Subject: Hospital District & Regional District Sponsorship of Community Events

INTENT

This report is intended to advise the Regional and Corporate Services Committee of information pertaining to the options available for Board sponsorship of community events. Staff is not looking for a recommendation and has forwarded this information should members want more clarification to discuss the item further.

STRATEGIC AREA(S) OF FOCUS

Support Healthy & Sustainable Community

BACKGROUND

At the September 25th Hospital District Board meeting the Board was presented with a sponsorship request letter from the Fraser Valley Health Care Foundation and their third annual "It's a Wonderful Breakfast" fundraiser. The goal of this event is to raise funds to support the purchase of a new CT Scanner at Chilliwack General Hospital. The Hospital District referred the letter back to Staff with a request to bring back information to October RACS regarding sponsorship of community events.

DISCUSSION

Hospital District

The type of items that may be funded under the Hospital District Act is quite limited. Specifically, Section 20 states that the purpose of a regional hospital district is to establish, acquire, construct, reconstruct, enlarge, operate and maintain hospital and hospital facilities or to grant aid to achieve these purposes. The HDA does not allow for the Hospital District to include funding for items outside of hospital or hospital facilities unless the minister designates an institution or facility in the health field as a health facility. With this in mind, there is currently no opportunity for the Hospital District to consider sponsorship of community events.

Regional District

There is more flexibility under the Local Government Act regarding what a regional district can fund. Specifically, Section 332 (1) allows the regional district to operate any service that the board considers necessary or desirable for all or part of the regional district. Section 263(1)(c) allows the board to provide assistance for the purpose of benefiting the community or any aspect of the community. Based on Section 263 the Board adopted the Regional Grant-in-Aid (GIA) policy in 1999 to help guide funding decisions. In order to allow the Board the ability to respond to community sponsorship requests in a timing fashion, the Board would need to support the establishment of an annual budget for the Regional GIA program, something that is currently not in place. Recent history has seen the Regional GIA program be reserved for very large contributions to regionally based health related facilities. An informal survey of regional districts came back with a number of positive responses regarding the establishment of Regional GIA programs to provide their Boards with the ability to address these type of requests.

COST

If the Board decides to establish an annual Regional GIA program to provide opportunities in sponsorship of community events, there will be a resulting taxation requisition impact. Given this would be spread out over the regional assessment base, the impact per average residential property would be small. For example, to generate a budget of \$10,000 would be between \$0.04 and \$0.08 per average residential property (the average is different throughout the regional district).

CONCLUSION

In response to a request from the Hospital District Board, Staff have presented information pertaining to the Hospital District and Regional District Boards' ability to support community events through sponsorship funding. The HDA is quite limiting while the LGA does provide the Regional Board with a funding opportunity.

FRASER VALLEY REGIONAL DISTRICT POLICY AND PROCEDURES

SUBJECT: Grant-in-Aid

EFFECTIVE DATE: October 26, 1999

REVISION DATE:

Purpose:

To allow for a grant-in-aid on behalf of the entire Regional District.

Eligibility:

To be eligible for a grant-in-aid on behalf of the entire Regional District, the party must be a community group or organization whose focus or purpose is in the arts, cultural, recreational, or social services, but only if:

- not commercial in nature;
- it is incorporated, either under the Societies Act of BC or under any federal act as a charitable organization;
- if the request for funding is under \$500, it may be an unincorporated group with a written constitution which outlines the objectives of the group as being charitable in nature;
- there is demonstrable financial need;
- funding would benefit the residents of the Regional District; and
- an organization which has an application for a grant-in-aid under consideration by a member municipality, or which has been approved for grant-in-aid funding from a member municipality will be ineligible for funding from the Regional District. This does not apply to a grant-in-aid that may be considered for funding in an electoral area/areas only.

Grant Criteria:

- The organization will have a large number of volunteers and able to demonstrate a broad base of community support.
- The activity or program is accessible to a large portion of the Regional District communities' residents.
- The activity or program is consistent with the objectives and standards of the community as represented to and supported by the Regional District Board.
- No contribution will be made toward travel expenses for individuals or teams to sporting events as this will not be considered as a regional grant-in-aid. Said individuals or teams may make representation to member municipalities or electoral areas where applicable.

- Non-profit societies operating at regional, provincial, or federal levels and conducting fundraising by means of tag days, mail outs, door-to-door campaigns, or telethons will not be eligible for grants-in-aid from the Regional District.
- Organizations which receive a fee-for-service from the Regional District are not eligible for grant-in-aid funding under this regional policy, unless the application is for a program other than the fee-for-service program.
- Preference will be given to applications with at least 50% of required funding coming from sources other than the Regional District.
- Applicants will provide as much detailed information as is possible on their organization including financial statements and annual operating budgets for the immediate year and future year.
- All completed grant applications for funding from any regional grant-in-aid will be forwarded to the Executive Committee prior to December 31 for review. The Executive Committee will review each application and make recommendations to the Board as to whether grants should be approved, and the amount, subject to fund availability in the annual budget.

Payment:

- No approved grant will be paid until the adoption of the annual budget.
- The term for the grant shall be for one year only. Applicants are to be advised that the grant-in-aid will not be continued in subsequent years without further application. Renewals are not automatic nor is any increase in funds.
- No grant will be made to pay for past deficits incurred by non-profit societies.
- All applicants must submit a statement on the use of the funds at the end of the event/ project or the end of the calendar year, whichever occurs first. Failure to provide such an evaluation will result in any future grant request being rejected.

Subject: 2018 Southern Interior Waste Managers' Association Conference - overview

INTENT

This report is intended to advise the Committee of information pertaining to the recent Southern Interior Waste Managers' Association Conference, hosted by the Fraser Valley Regional District at the Harrison Hot Springs resort in September 2018. Staff is not looking for a recommendation and has forwarded this information should members want more clarification or to discuss the item further.

BACKGROUND

The Southern Interior Waste Managers' Association (SIWMA) was established in 1994 and is made up of representatives from 12 member regional districts and 3 associated municipal members. It is a small and personal conference which is convened annually and hosted by a different regional district each year. The Fraser Valley Regional District (FVRD) hosted this year's conference at the Harrison Hot Springs resort over 4 days from September 18 – 21, 2018. Member municipal representatives from the FVRD attended throughout including staff from Metro Vancouver.

The conference provides a venue for technical staff overseeing solid waste management and operations within represented regions and municipalities to exchange ideas, to share information about programs and initiatives, and to collaborate on issues related to solid waste reduction, public education, recycling and residual waste management. Opportunities are taken to visit local waste management facilities and to update participants on recent policy changes or new developments in solid waste management. The FVRD is included in SIWMA as our region borders the Thompson Nicola Regional

District and the Okanagan-Similkameen Regional District where infrastructure and programs are similar issues to our Electoral Areas and smaller municipalities.

DISCUSSION

A total of 61 people participated in this year's SIWMA conference including staff from local and provincial government, first nations, waste management companies and consultants as well as non-profit organizations (please see attached program outline for more details). A work shop, specifically for local government and Ministry of Environment staff was provided on the first day to review and discuss the *New Landfill Criteria* and to explore the potential ramifications across BC for local governments. A working group was convened to explore risk management solutions and next steps.

An official welcome was provided on the morning of Day 2 by the Mayor of the Village of Harrison Hot Springs, Director Leo Facio as well as a traditional First Nations welcome by Counsellor Boyd Peters from Sts'ailes First Nation. Day 2 provided a chance for each regional district to present and update each other on developments over the past twelve months.

On Day 3 the group toured several local waste management facilities including the Fraser Valley Biogas anaerobic digester and Redux Nutrition, both of which use food waste to make products and align with the food waste hierarchy. To understand the recycling process of small electronic products the group also toured eCycle Solutions.

Day 4 continued with several presentations that explored local programs and initiatives, including an introduction to mixed waste processing, the new mattress recycling facility in Hope, Household Hazardous Waste Day and the Illegal Dumping in Our Township campaign by the Township of Langley. Finally, Recycle BC presented on their program and were questioned on the decision to burn *other flexible packaging* as an energy fuel. The conference concluded by looking at the future use of landfills.

COST

The SIWMA conference does not impact the FVRD Solid Waste budget. It is entirely funded by a combination of contributions from sponsorship, registration of guests and the SIWMA budget which has been funded by membership fees since its inception. Costs to the FVRD relate to hotel accommodation (\$1,100) and time for organizing the event. The FVRD will not be required to organize SIWMA again until 2030.

CONCLUSION

The 2018 SIWMA conference was deemed a huge success by attendees. The FVRD was able to showcase initiatives and processes for organics diversion that are not currently occurring within the BC interior. A spotlight was provided to companies and organizations pursuing materials recovery and driving innovation in solid waste. The small and intimate nature of the SIWMA conference gave all participants a platform to network, connect and learn from each other. Regional districts will continue to develop relationships and collaborate together to maximize diversion across British Columbia through the SIWMA forum.

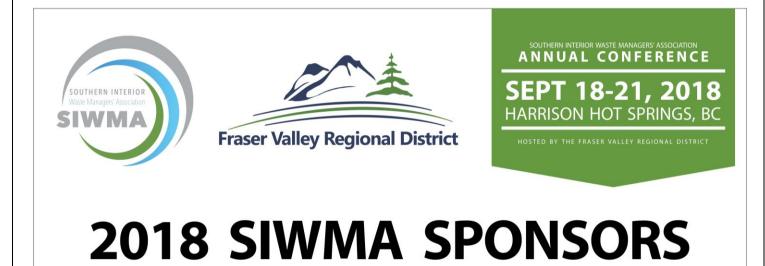
