

Volunteer Trail Builder Training Program

Project Summary

The goal of this grant was to help increase organizational capacity for trail care by providing training in trail maintenance best practices and trail standards to volunteers within the community.

A total of 7 trail building workshops on the Essentials of Trail Care, Bridges & Boardwalks, and Rock Work were held in Fall 2023, with a total of 64 participants, 8 of whom completed all three of the courses. These courses contributed 512 hours of volunteer training & work to caring for the trails. After completion of each course, participants received tools to enable them to continue volunteering within the trail networks that FVMBA cares for. Already we are seeing tangible benefits - workshop attendees have also participated in other FVMBA trail days, taken on the responsibility for caring for a trail, and are engaging more with the community. We look forward to seeing these benefits continue to grow into the new year and beyond.

Training additional volunteers in trail maintenance best practices and trail standards increases the capacity of the FVMBA to ensure the safety and enjoyment of the trails for all trail users. This is important to support the management and sustainable growth of mountain biking as well as hiking, trail running, and other non-motorized activities on trail networks within the Fraser Valley.

A summary of grant funding spent to date is provided below. An additional summary will be provided in April (12 months after the receipt of the grant). Receipts and invoices available on request.

As I am sure you are aware, 2023 was a difficult year for Hemlock Valley as the drought severely affected our community. For most of the summer we were under severe water restrictions, and at times even without water, all while nearby forest fires threatened our community. This impacted our plans and ideas as it would have been irresponsible to attract people to our community during this time. Many of our winter ideas have also not materialized as mother nature has again chosen not to cooperate by not providing our mountain with snow.

That said, we were proud to be able to achieve the following:



Fraser Valley Regional Grant Report

Our Abbotsford and Chilliwack Stroke Recovery Branches continue to grow and flourish. Currently, our Abbotsford program retains a membership of 30 participants. Our Chilliwack program has 12 participants who attend on a regular basis. We continue to receive referrals from both Chilliwack and Abbotsford hospitals, which serves to help to increase the number of individuals who are knowledgeable of our programs and helps to assist our programs to grow in numbers.

With the generous support of the Fraser Valley Regional District, both Abbotsford and Chilliwack Stroke Recovery Branches have been able to offer Seated Yoga and Exercise sessions once per month. These sessions are led by a BCRPA-certified Exercise Instructor and a Certified Yoga Instructor. Participants have expressed their pleasure in being able to actively participate in both the yoga and exercise sessions. Our contracted Instructors, provide modified movements as necessary to help ensure that all participants have the opportunity to be fully integrated into the experience.

The Fraser Valley Regional Grant has also been utilized to help support the rental costs of our Abbotsford Stroke Recovery program. This has been helpful in ensuring a consistent venue for our Abbotsford Stroke Recovery program participants.

Our anticipated projected expenditures from January 2024 – March 2024 will include continuation of yoga and exercise sessions for our Abbotsford and Chilliwack programs, rent for the Abbotsford program and the purchase of resources that will assist participants to re-learn, practice and improve skills that help in day-to-day activities. These resources will focus on the following: education, cognitive development and mental health wellness.


